## A Message From Our Nurse, Mrs. Perkins

Helping Your Student Prepare for a Day at School.

What are the things that a middle school student needs to be successful in school? You, no doubt, know the answer - a good night's sleep and a healthy breakfast. Early adolescents require about 9 hours of sleep per night to function at their best. Sleep is important to maintain a healthy body, helping the immune system, and improving energy levels, learning and concentration. A lack of sleep can have a negative effect on emotions, behavior, attention, social relationships and school performance.

Breakfast is the most important meal of the day! That fact has not changed since we first learned it in school. That first meal of the day improves brain function, particularly memory and recall. Research shows that students who eat breakfast perform better academically. A healthy breakfast of a combination of protein and carbohydrates is a perfect opportunity to provide your student with energy for the day and carry them through to lunch.

Getting your student to comply with both of these practices may be a challenge, but it's worth the fight to help your child be the best that they can be!
