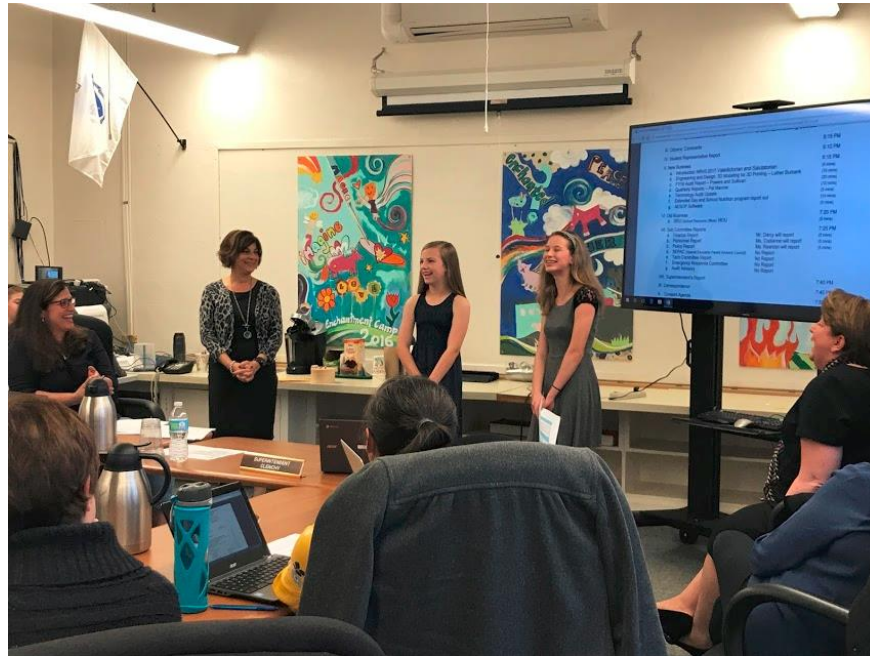

As you know, it can be difficult to keep up with all that our kids are involved with on the internet. While there are lots of great learning tools, fun games, movies, innovative ways to keep in touch with friends around the world to name a few of the many positives, there is also a darker side, too. One of the newer games or challenges that seems to be making the rounds is the Blue Whale Challenge. Reportedly, it is aimed at the 10-14 year age group. There are a series of escalating challenges that the child must complete over the course of 50 days with the final one to win, being suicide. It is difficult to determine if this is real or urban legend. But, either way, it can provide parents/guardians with an opportunity to open a dialogue with their child about the positives and negatives of surfing the world wide web as well as the topic of self-harm and suicide. While the hope is that no child would ever become immersed in something that seems so absurd, there are kids that could be vulnerable.
